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HARRISONBURG — Numerous events are planned for today, the holiday commemorating the life of Martin Luther King Jr., and at other times during the week as area schools and organizations pay tribute to the late civil rights leader. Among planned celebrations, will be today's 28th annual Martin Luther King Jr. Community Breakfast, hosted by the Harrisonburg Sigma Gamma Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority. The breakfast starts at 8 a.m. in the Lucy F. Simms Continuing Education Center, 620 Simms Ave., Harrisonburg.

The breakfast, which is open to the public, will feature several speakers, including Harrisonburg Mayor Deanna Reed, City Manager Eric Campbell and Police Chief Eric English. Rose L. Parks Woman of Courage Award in 2002, is one of the most celebrated African-American poets in the world. The **college**, in partnership with the town of Bridgewater, will host a community gathering called "Celebrating the Dream, Continuing the Journey" at noon today in Oakdale Park. Attendees will march to the town hall where Bridgewater Mayor Ted Flory and **Bridgewater College** President David Bushman will speak, and the march will continue until Kline Campus Center.
